## PASS The Rhode Island Works Program

S-2337 (MURRAY) AND H-7686 (HANDY)

These bills propose three changes to Rhode Island Works, the state's cash and workforce readiness program, that can help end deep child poverty in Rhode Island. In December, 2023, 70% of RI Works beneficiaries were children, and 41% of these children enrolled in RI Works were under the age of six.


- 1. Protect Rhode Island's poorest children and families from inflation: Increase the monthly benefit to 50% of the federal poverty level and include a cost-of-living increase.
  - The 2021 increase in cash benefits improved the economic well-being of 5,000 children, but inflation has quickly decreased its value.
  - In 2023, the RI Works benefit was only 35% of the federal poverty level, with a family of three receiving \$721/month. Increasing the benefits to 50% of the poverty level (\$1,036 for a family of 3) would greatly assist Rhode Island's neediest children. Using funds from the \$96M federal TANF block grant would safeguard Rhode Island's investment.

## 2. Undo harm to children: Repeal the full family sanction

If a parent is sanctioned three times during their lifetime, their family loses
the RI Works benefit altogether, impacting children too. National studies
indicate that sanctions disproportionately affect parents facing significant
challenges such as health issues, limited education, and domestic violence,
and they do not enhance program compliance. Reopening cases poses an
administrative challenge for the Rhode Island Department of Human
Services.



- LPRs are currently eligible for RI works once they have been in that status for five years.
- Before 2007, Rhode Island provided cash assistance to LPRs without this waiting period.
- By providing RI Works benefits to LPR families with no waiting period, Rhode Island would join 13 other states in supporting the well-being of these residents.
