### What It Is:

Inspired by community conversations and the recent debates about health equity, the **MetroWest Health Equity Timeline (HET)** illustrates how local historical events — including legislation, policies, social movements, and individual actions — have shaped **health disparities and outcomes** in the region today. The HET tells the story of our region through the lens of health equity as a nonpartisan, human rights issue.

### The HET

- Demonstrates systemic challenges through personal and relatable storytelling
- Educates users about complicated health equity concepts such as social determinants of health, intersectionality, root causes of disparities, and systemic change by making them more relatable and easily understood
- Provides historical and sociopolitical context for public health practitioners, human services staff, board members, students, and newcomers to the region to understand the forces behind present-day disparities
- Helps nonprofits and local leaders articulate why their work matters
- Encourages civic engagement by providing tangible, population- and region-specific examples of policy actions and impacts
- Helps users see public health infrastructure and their own communities as part of a larger system
- Creates a launchpad for discussion, curriculum, and personal or professional exploration
- Helps users identify commonalities and challenge assumptions about their neighbors by highlighting the breadth of experiences and identities in our region
